


Georgetown Map and Guanella Pass Route

Since the 1880's, Georgetown has attracted visitors from around the world. Then, as now, people came to shop, dine, enjoy the dramatic scenery and ride the famous **Georgetown Loop Railroad**.

Today, visitors can imagine themselves back in the 19th century as they stroll through Georgetown's narrow streets and enjoy the historic buildings, many of which have been lovingly restored. Although most are privately owned, town residents are accustomed to visitors stopping in front of their homes and even taking pictures. However, visitors are requested to respect private property boundaries.

Many sites are open, at least on a seasonal basis, to visitors.

The Georgetown Loop Railroad, the Georgetown Energy Museum, The Hamill House Museum, and the Hotel De Paris Museum are open every day in the summer season. The Bowman/White House museum is open some weekends in summer. Please check at one of the Town's two visitor information centers for hours as well as for other activities that may be under way.

Activity highlights include the July 4th Independence Day festivities and barbecue (since 1972), the Annual Christmas Market activities (since 1960 and always the first two full week-ends in December) and Christmas at Hamill House (since 1971). Further information is also available at the information centers.

A drive over the Guanella Pass Scenic and Historic Byway is another way to enjoy the scenery of the Colorado Rockies. The road begins in Georgetown and ends 24 miles later in the Town of Grant. Be alert for deer and other critters on the road.

Wildlife abounds in the area, particularly the Rocky Mountain Bighorn Sheep, that can best be seen from the Wildlife Viewing Station located at the north end of Georgetown Lake.
